The following is taken from the Pitts-
burg Times of Oct. 22:

Penfield, Pa., Oct. 21.—This village and
its township, Huston, challenge the
United States to produce two veterans of
the late war who entered the service
younger than did Harrison McHenry and
Darius Newell.

In October, 1861, McHenry was a boy
of 14 years, bound out to a farmer in
Chester county, Pa. Inflamed with the
war fever, he had spoken to Capt. Charles
McIvaine on Sunday, and had been told
by getting permission of his parents he
would be allowed to enlist as a drummer
boy. McHenry's parents lived in Phila-
delphia, and as the company was gather-
ed at Westchester for enlistment on
Tuesday, the boy could not wait. So,
when on this morning, as was his custom,
he went after the cows, he kept on going,
and enlisted with the soldiers at West-
chester.

His employer came after him, but in
the meantime his parents' permission
had been obtained, and the boy's way
seemed clear to serve his country. But
11 companies had been raised, and Mc-
Henry was given his choice to take a
musket or go home. He chose the former,
and for three years served as a private
under Gens. Mitchell, Sherman, Hunter
and Gilmore in South Carolina, joining
the Army of the James under Gen. B. F.
Butler in the spring of 1864.

Darius Newell was less than a year
older than McHenry when he enlisted
from this township in 1862. He, too,
carried a gun, and participated in many
of the fierce battles of the rebellion.

Both these veterans are now recipients
of pensions. McHenry is a jeweler and
Newell a farmer. The latter is at present
secretary of the school board of Huston
township.
