IN MEMORIAM.

Jacob W. Rosenkrans was born in Sus-
 sex Co. N. J. Oct. 3, 1829 and died at Pen-
 field Pa., Sept. 16, 1898 aged 68 years, 11
 months, 13 days. His father Abraham Van
 Campen Rosenkrans was a descendant of
 the early settlers of New York City and
 his mother, Belinda Myers ancestors also
 came from Holland.

When Jacob was a youth his parents
 came to Pike Co., and afterwards to Jeff-
 erson township Luzerne Co., Pa. The
 other children of the family were Wyn-
 coop, Belinda, Mrs. Ralph Potter, Harri-
 etta, Mrs. Denison Wetherill, John, Peter,
 Abram, V. C. all deceased, and Mrs. Ellen
 Curtis of Gravity, Wayne Co., the only
 one of the children now living.

Jacob was married in 1852 to Ann
 Mariah Watrous, daughter of Jonathan B.
 Watrous and Matilda Moore. John Wat-
 rous was a soldier in the war of 1812, and
 died at the age of 85 years and his widow
 at the age of 87.

For thirteen years after marriage Jacob
 Rosenkrans followed the occupation of
 car runner on the Pennsylvania Coal Co's.
 Gravity R. R.

For nine months during 1862 he was
 serving in the 179th Regiment of Penn'a.
 Volunteers in the Civil War. The regi-
 ment was with McLellan at the close of
 the Peninsular campaign, and was en-
 gaged in some minor skirmishes. The
 deceased was Orderly Sergeant of his
 company.

In August 1865 Jacob moved his fam-
 ily to Penfield, Clearfield Co., where he
 has since lived, engaging in farming, lum-
 bering some and the coal business.

The children are Allen, George, who
 shot himself by accident on Sept. 19, 1870,
 Frank, Ella, Mrs. Dr. E. C. Lewis, Clara,
 Mrs. T. S. Lewis, Friend, Ray, and How-
 ard who died in 1881

For several years past the deceased has
 been very painfully afflicted with a ser-
 ious disease of the bladder. On August
 15th he had a severe attack that left him

 in a bad state and from then until his
 death he did not leave his bed. Dr. S. E.
 Hayes the physician, assisted by Dr. R.
 Smith, did all that medical skill was cap-
 able of, but the progress toward the tomb
 could not be stayed. As the end drew
 near the sufferings of the man became
 more and more intense until his exper-
 ience with pain was truly pitiful. But
 the patience that had characterized his
 life marked his endurance in those dread
 hours. On the beautiful September day
 as noon drew near the pain demon de-
 parted, and dying peace came to the sore
 and weary one. Gentler and more gently
 the breathing until the last faint exha-
 lation and the sufferer was sweetly at rest.

The deceased was a member of Clear-
 field Odd Fellows lodge and also Clear-
 field K of P. Likewise of the G. A. R.
 when the camp was existent at Penfield.
 He had held the offices of Tax Collector,
 Auditor, Township Treasurer and Super-
 visor in Huston. During the great revival
 under Rev. E. M. Chilcoat in 1875 the de-
 ceased became a seeker at the penitent
 form and was definitely and happily con-
 verted. He joined the Methodist church
 but afterwards withdrew. In his mortal
 illness, by the path of penitence and
 prayer he seemed to return from his wan-
 dering in the wilderness of backsliding,
 and to the writer he said that the future
 was bright.

The funeral was on Sunday morning at
 10 a. m., in the Presbyterian Church at
 Penfield; Rev. J. Guldin, Methodist pas-
 tor and W. L. Joyce director in charge
 and Rev. Caldwell, Presbyterian and Rev.
 Sager, Free Methodist pastors assisting.
 The interment was in Penfield cemetery,
 and there was laid to final rest the kind
 husband, father and friend, the honest,
 industrious man.
